
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Happy Thanksgiving to Everyone!

Check Your Trees this Fall for Ivy!

The fall is a great time to remove unwanted ivy from you trees. That's because the colder the weather gets, the more likely it is that the ivy on your tree will die once you cut the roots at the base of the your tree. Not only does ivy transmit disease to the tree, but it also deprives its leaves of needed sunlight, and burdens the entire tree with its weight, making lower limbs susceptible to breaking-off during storms. Typically, as the vines grow up the tree, the tree eventually loses its lower limbs, leaving a "broccoli head" canopy at the remaining top part. To protect your tree, cut the roots of the ivy at the tree's base, and also try to remove as many of the vines as you can from the trunk. In most cases, if the infestation is not extreme, this should suffice to kill the plant, although it may continue to live off of the tree bark for a few more months.

Sudbrook Park is renowned for its beautiful tree canopy. And in addition to enhancing the beauty of our neighborhood, this canopy keeps the Park significantly cooler in the summer! Please do your part to protect our tree canopy by checking your trees for uncontrolled ivy infestation!

Differences between Bag Worms, Fall Web Worms & Tent Caterpillars

Bag Worms camouflage their web using bits of the tree they are living on, creating little hanging "bags" on arborvitae, Leyland cypress and juniper. To get rid of them, pick or clip them the bags off the limbs and drop them into a bucket of hot soapy water.

Fall Web Worms create large webs at the end of tree branches, bushes and shrubs at the end of summer into fall. Simply pull down the web, which will leave the worms exposed to birds and insects. Although unsightly, they usually do not harm the tree's overall health.

The Eastern Tent Caterpillar is often confused with the Fall Web Worm, but Tent Caterpillars form webs in the crotches of a tree in late spring-summer, while Web Worms form their webs at the end of branches late summer into fall.
